TRUST GOD IN THE HIGHS AND LOWS

Dear Friends,

Our VCE cohort have just finished their last exams and attended their Valedictory Dinner.

This special Valedictory event honours each student in their journey at St Andrews Christian College. But it also gives us one more opportunity to input into their lives before they venture into the big wide world.

As Principal, my speech on the night is delivered to bless each student, with a sole intention of reminding everyone of the main thing! The main thing being Christ.

In all the places that life will lead us, the victories and achievements, there will also be hard times where life will not go as planned. If our identity and significance in life is based on our VCE results, career, accumulated wealth or status then we are on the path of just self-fulfilment and life easily crumbles. If our identity is in Jesus, then everything that happens does so for a reason and we are able to glorify God through our talents, experiences, education and careers, and nestle into Him, learning from Him in our failures and disappointments.

I have recently read Sheridan Voysey's story (The Making of Us: Who we Can Become When Life Doesn't Go as Planned) of his pilgrimage in England, where he followed the steps of Cuthbert, who was a medieval monk. Cuthbert traipsed the countryside, evangelising, baptising thousands and influencing people for Christ. His influence helped change the course of history and Christianity took root in the north of England.

Sheridan writes:

"Artists are judged by their body of work, not by one single painting or performance. And it seemed to me that Cuthbert's life would be judged in the same manner – not by its headlines alone but by the fine print in between. He rose in rank, saw thousands come to faith, became a counsellor to kings and queens. But did any of these accomplishments outweigh the kiss placed on that fevered forehead? (Cuthbert cared for paupers and peasants).

Cuthbert's one big thing wasn't seeing ministries built, movements started, or any grand plan achieved. The one big thing was the entirety of his life. The great and the small of it given as an offering.

"Cuthbert's vision had been the Composer and the great symphony, performing whatever part he was called to play."

So, the main thing in our lives, in whatever happens and wherever we are, is to keep trusting in the Lord and being a light for him in the big and the small, the important and the mundane things in life.

Proverbs 3: 1-6

My child, never forget the things I have taught you.

Store my commands in your heart. If you do this, you will live many years, and your life will be satisfying. Never let loyalty and kindness leave you! Tie them around your neck as a reminder.

Write them deep within your heart. Then you will find favour with both God and people, and you will earn a good reputation.

Trust in the Lord with all your heart; do not depend on your own understanding. seek his will in all you do, and he will show you which path to take.

At the end of his journey, Sheridan Voysey wrote a statement of how he was going to live life and he called it '**The Creed**'.

Be blessed, be encouraged and challenged as you read it.

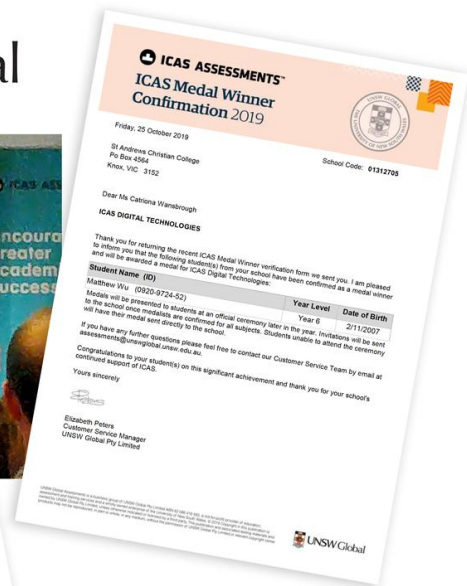
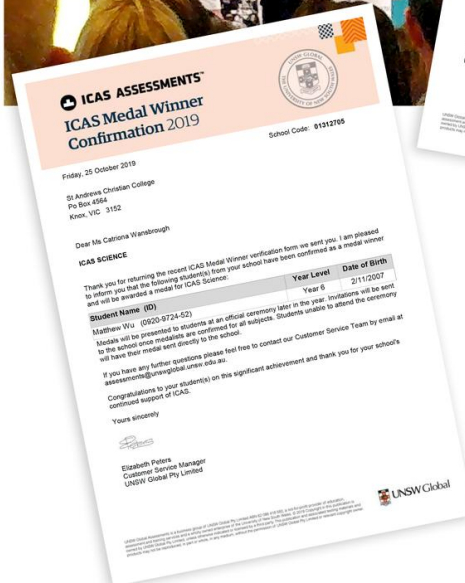
MATTHEW WU, ICAS DUAL MEDAL WINNER

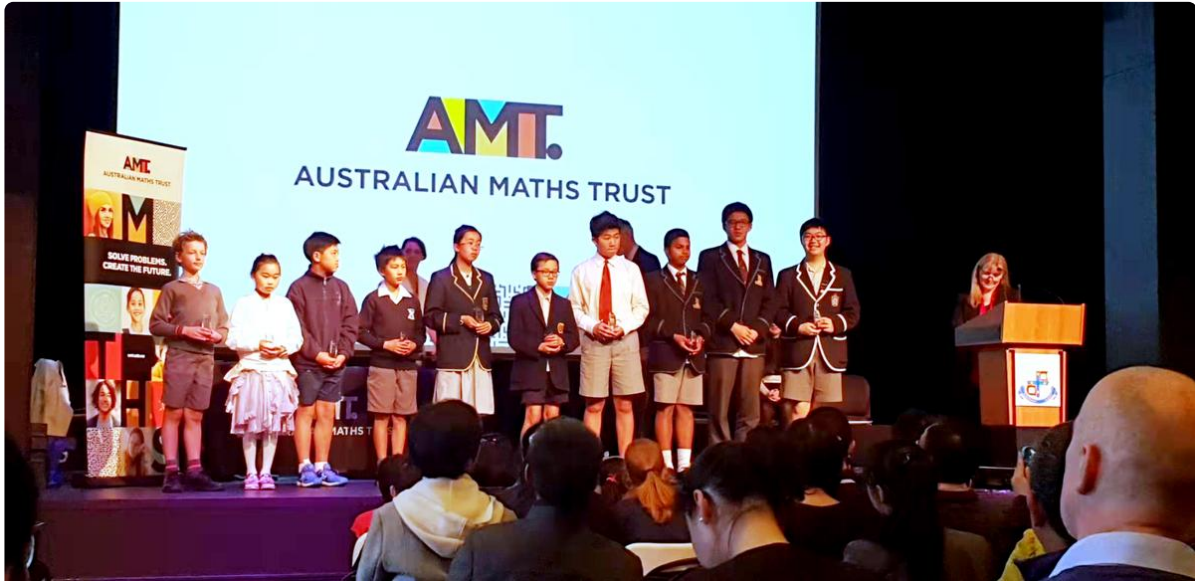

YEAR 11 CHEMICAL ANALYSIS AT VSSEC



All Year 11 Chemistry students attended a full-day program covering Area of study 2: Chemical Analysis which relates to our Unit 2, AOS 2 conducted by the Victorian Space Science Education Centre (VSSEC). Students were able to have hands-on experience of using the Atomic Absorption Spectrometer, the UV Visible Spectrometer and the High Pressure Liquid Chromatograph. All instrumental analysis was performed directly by the students including the calibration of the instruments and the preparation and use of standard solutions and samples. Students were thrilled with the use of sophisticated instruments that they were able to use and handle. Overall, a great learning experience for the students which also prepares them for Year 12 Chemistry.

Students visited the IMAX to watch an educational movie titled "AUSTRALIA: THE WILD TOP END 3D. Far Northern Australia is a land of extremes, from bushfires to torrential floods. Students explored the wildlife and met the people in Australia's wild top end, from the Kimberley coast through to the mysterious Arnhem Land, and deep into the world's oldest rainforest in Cape York. Students learnt about the lives of the

inhabitants of this ancient landscape, following the life cycle of the saltwater crocodile and the hunt for new frog species. They also explored a living cave with ancient Indigenous artwork and observed the deep connection first Australians have with their land and country. Students also visited the Melbourne Museum where they conducted a generalised viewing under teacher supervision. 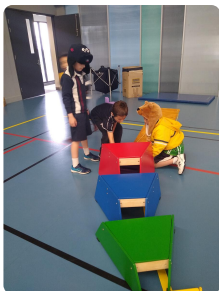

During our final rehearsals, some of us were so nervous that we had major mess-ups, but thanks to Mrs Elbourne's prayers and words of encouragement to each other, we managed to make it through the official performance confidently, delivering a flawless presentation to our audience.

What I loved the most during the process of our production is being able to perceive our development through the process of communication and cooperation between each other, especially when people had to fill the parts of others was just incredible. I enjoyed working with all of my talented classmates and I also learned a lot about the preparation of an official performance. The amount of effort and enthusiasm we put in a production is a huge factor in how a show would turn out, becoming a reflection on what we've achieved through our struggles and a myriad of experimentation.


