Dear Friends,

It is our prayer to grow more like Christ in all we do and for us to continue to grow in excellence in all we do – for His glory, not ours.

One of my favourite (it changes all the time) books of the Bible is DANIEL. Whether we are a parent, child or educator we can all learn much from Daniel.

He was a man of prayer, a man of wisdom and knowledge and he stood firm on his convictions and trusted God.

Daniel and his three friends (most probably all teenagers) were taught well in some little Christian school (synagogue) in Israel.

They were young men from nobility of Judah who had been taken captives to Babylon. They were

chosen for their good looks and talents to serve in King Nebuchadnezzar's court.

The Babylonians did not observe Jewish food laws, so Daniel and his 3 companions decided not to compromise their religious beliefs by eating the food provided by the King and requested a vegetarian diet (Daniel 1:8).

I love the dignity and good manners of Daniel who asked for permission not to defile himself and then his creativeness and boldness to offer a solution – a 10 day trial where Daniel and his companions would only eat vegetables and others would eat meat. The purpose was to see who was healthier and wiser after the 10 day trial.

For Daniel there was no compromise on his convictions. As a man of prayer and courage he did not conform to others when it stood between him and His God.

"Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will."

Romans 12:2

"Conformity to worldly culture converts the church to the world; it never converts the world to Christ." (Author unknown)

Daniel and his friends stood by their convictions and God honoured them (Daniel 1:17-20).

Remember the story of Eric Liddell in the 1924 Olympic Games?

The 100m sprint race was his speciality, yet Eric Liddell stood by his convictions and would not run in the 100m race because the race was on a Sunday. Imagine the pressure he would have had from his friends, coach, team mates, but also

pressure put on him from 'his country' to run in this race.

Against public opinion, Liddell stood strong in wanting to honour God. He did not run on a Sunday and instead ran in the 400m race and won the race in record time (47.6 secs). Liddell gave all the glory to God.

We must remain strong to honour God in all aspects of our lives and honour God in everything we do at St Andrews.

We give God all, be obedient and faithful and He will do the rest.

School Crossing

NAPLAN

St Andrews Christian College
has continued to perform at a
high academic level, according
to our recent NAPLAN results.
The NAPLAN tests provide an
individual standard of
comparison across the State.
These individual results are
also presented as an overall
performance of the College,
along with the comparisons of
similar, or like Schools, as well

as a comparison against the State.

The tests, this year covered the areas of Writing, Spelling, Grammar and Punctuation, Numeracy (Mathematics) and Reading. The NAPLAN tests are conducted at Year 3, 5, 7 and 9. If a student has been attending St Andrews from Year 3 to Year 9, analysis also allows us to track relative individual growth, along with growth as a School. There are

5 tests at each year level leaving a total of 15 areas of data that can be analysed.

Some of our improvements are evident in the comparisons of the State averages. Initial analysis of our results reveal that at every year level of the test, and for every subject area covered, our average students are in the top 25% of the State. In at least one third of the 15 areas, our bottom 25% are above the State average.

These are very impressive results and reflect the hard work that is carried out by staff in order to drive a valuable learning experience that is making a positive impact on learning. Vaccines

Free meningococcal ACWY vaccine for adolescents aged 15 to 19

In 2017 one free
meningococcal ACWY vaccine
is offered to Victorian students
aged 15 to 19, or in Years 10,
11 12. The vaccine provides
protection against four strains
of meningococcal disease
(ACWY) and is administered as
a single dose.

Adolescents are at increased risk of meningococcal disease. Although uncommon, it can become life-threatening, very quickly. In recent years, the meningococcal W strain has increased across Australia, it is now the predominant strain in Victoria.

Eligible students who has not received this vaccine can attend either a local council community immunisation session, or a General Practitioner to receive the free vaccine by 31 December 2017. 
The students had had a great week of incredible art experiences and Friday was a fun way to finish the week.

Year 4 One Tree Per Child Program

On 31st August 2017, Year 4s walked to Egan Lee Reserve in Knoxfield to do the One Tree Per Child program. This program involves school children volunteering to plant trees and become involved in their local community.



When we arrived, a man from the Knox City Council welcomed us and took us on a short nature walk. On the nature walk, we learnt about the two main introduced predators in Victoria, foxes and cats, and how they threaten our

small wildlife such as lizards, possums and birds.

After the walk, two people from the One Tree Per Child program demonstrated how to plant trees using a Hamilton, or a pogo stick as some students called it. Before we left school, we thought we would be planting one tree each. However, it turned out to our disbelief, that we would be planting 350 trees. We set to work, working in pairs carefully to plant the trees. Once we got the hang of it, we swiftly got the job done.



Then we played a game using a sticker we each received with either a tree, lizard, possum, owl or bird on it. During the game, when the music stopped, we had to form hollows (two trees holding hands), with one possum or bird, one owl and one lizard inside. After every round, trees

were removed, leaving more and more animals homeless.
We learnt how important trees are to providing animals' homes. It was also interesting to learn that a hollow big enough for an owl to live in takes at least 200 years to form.

We all enjoyed planting trees and learning how important trees are to our wildlife. It was a wonderful feeling knowing we had made a small difference to our community.

VCE Exams

A key step of this initiative was to apply to hold our Written Examinations at St Andrews, as opposed to sending our students to an unfamiliar, offsite location. students will sit their Unit 3&4 exams at their own school!

Another initiative to help our students with their Unit 3 and 4 VCE exams is to run trial exams during the school holidays. Students will sit in an exam environment—which will be the same location and setup of their actual exams. The exams will be invigilated by staff from St Andrews who are not their own teachers, in order to further simulate test conditions. Feedback from these practice exams will be exceptionally useful to teachers to formulate revision

plans, but importantly to students to give them a picture of where they can best focus their personal revision prior to the actual exams.

Year 10 Geography Field Trip to Mornington Peninsula

On the 14th of September, class 10Y went on a field trip to Mornington Peninsula, to investigate how their coasts are managed. The trip was separated into 3 main locations; Sorrento Ocean Beach, Weeroona Bay (Portsea) and Sorrento foreshore.

Instead of only learning from a textbook, field trips such as these allows one to broaden their perspective on the things learned inside the classroom.

On the 8th of September, Mr. Fernandes took us to the Victorian Space Science Education Centre (VSSEC).



The facility provided us with a magnitude of opportunities.
We engaged in a plethora of experiments, an example being determining the caffeine content present in caffeinated beverages. We utilized chemical analytical techniques such as UV-Visible
Spectroscopy, Atomic
Absorption Spectroscopy and Gas-Liquid Chromatography.



The experience as a whole was fulfilling and has furthered our understanding of chemical analysis.


Last week, the Senior Library










15th October, 1952
